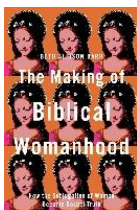
The Making of Biblical Womanhood: How the Subjugation of Women Became Gospel Truth

Barr approaches the gender question from her perspective as a medieval historical, but also influenced by her personal experiences in her prior complementarian contexts. Though based on technical historical details, her approach is readable. She walks through how the church has changed its view of women throughout the centuries and how various things have affected gender theology. Keep in mind that she is responding to the specific and harmful form of complementarianism that she experienced. Some complementarians argue that the comp. she is arguing against is not their version. (Though I have yet to see evidence to support that.)

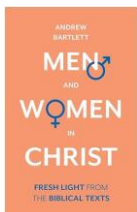

Bartlett approached the topic of the comp/egal debate seeking to weigh the arguments of both fairly, having not had come to any specific view himself. (He also addresses comp through a “softer” comp view that is not as extreme as the stereotypical Grudem/Piper approach.) Throughout the book (394pp!), he weighs the arguments of both and point out the evidence for and against. He ends up concluding that there is male headship in marriage, but not in women teaching or leading in the church.

Beynon and Tooher primarily address the question on how to live complementarianism well. They only touch on arguments for a complementarian perspective briefly. (It should also be noted that there are places where they briefly mention opposing views, but they only mention them vaguely and not in a way that fairly represents them.) When they touch on support for the comp perspective, they only do so on a surface level and ignore other issues. If you're looking for an in-depth defense of the comp perspective, this book is not that. But this book does a good job of exploring how to live out a complementarian theology while respecting and embracing the value of women.

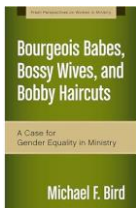

Neither Complementarian nor Egalitarian: A Kingdom Corrective to the Evangelical Gender Debate

Lee-Barnewall proposes, what she believes, is a third position in the complementarian/egalitarian debate. She argues that the issue is not authority or headship which is the cornerstone of mainstream complementarian views. But she allows for the possibility that some roles could be reserved for men alone (she refuses to conclude either way on this issue). She uses scripture to argue that leadership is about responsibility (not authority, power, or headship) and *servant* leadership. Both sides of the traditional debate will likely find areas of discomfort in her view. And egalitarians are likely to conclude that she presents a soft complementarian view. But, regardless, she does not argue for or against any role distinctions between the genders. And the theology of sacrificial leadership should be something that everyone should be willing to agree with.

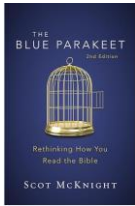

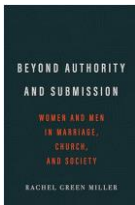
Beyond Authority and Submission: Women and Men in Marriage, Church, and Society

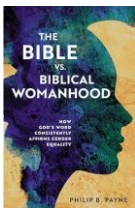

Why Can't Women Do That?: Breaking Down the Reasons Churches Put Men in Charge

This relatively thin book (170pp) covers the breadth of scriptures key in the argument. The writing is easy to read and concise. It is a good overview of the issues without providing an overwhelming amount of details and data. This could be a good introduction to the egal perspective, but if you need more details, other books such as the Keener or Westfall books may provide what you are looking for.

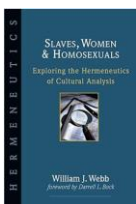
This is a dense (370pp!) and heavily technical book that I cannot recommend highly enough if you are looking for technical. Westfall presents a compelling argument for egalitarianism by taking scripture very seriously and providing an immense amount of support for her conclusions. Be prepared to encounter Greek within the book as she walks through the issues, but even if you do not know Greek, you can still follow her arguments.

Slaves, Women, & Homosexuals: Exploring the Hermeneutics of Cultural Analysis

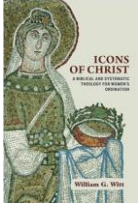

Webb's volume is not technically a view book on the complementarian/egalitarian debate. Rather, he proposes a "redemptive hermeneutic" in which he shows how the Bible supports the end of slavery, even though it seems to be approved of in earlier portions. He then argues that the same trajectory of women is visible in the Bible (that women are not limited). And then he shows how scripture does not use a similar trajectory to remove the sin of homosexuality, but continues to affirm its status of homosexual acts as a sin.



Icons of Christ: A Biblical and Systematic Theology for Women's Ordination

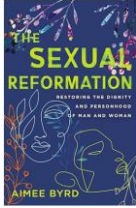

Byrd addresses the question of gender relationships through a look at the Song of Solomon. She uses a midrashic hermeneutic that may make those trained in grammar-translation hermeneutics uncomfortable. She approaches the question of the two genders not with a list of roles, but as a love song, communicated through the poetry of the Song of Solomon.

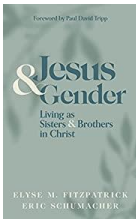

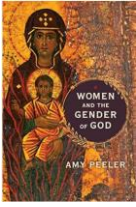

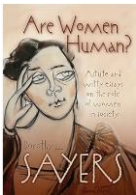
Peeler's volume affirms the maleness of Jesus Christ (who is fully God and fully man), but not the maleness of God. Yet, she also argues strongly that God the Father should be called "Father," not because of any gender element but because he is the one who "begot" Jesus. She argues strongly that God is never sexualized. Peeler also argues for a deep respect for Mary, as the mother of Jesus, and the value of women in the Church and the need to speak out against the "destructive idolatry of masculinity."

She first examines key passages (Rom 16, 1 Tim 3 and 5) in patristic teachings. She then walks through the key evidence for female deacons and presbyters through the 6th century. She looks at what the women did and how the Church received them.



The Samaritan Woman's Story: Reconsidering John 4 After #ChurchToo

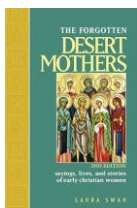

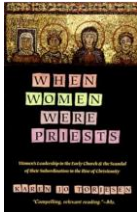

Torjesen provides evidence of how cultural perceptions of women bled into the church and limited what the church allowed women to do. It includes topics such as patronage, views of sexuality, honor, and marriage. A great benefit of this book is the large number of block quotes from early sources that allows the audience to read the early views for themselves. The book concludes that outside forces and perceptions of women bled into the church causing the subordination of women.

Bad gender theology often ends up with women being taught that only men matter in sex, and to accept abuse and/or pain as the norm. Gregoire argues against such horrible teachings. Though she focuses on the experiences of women, men should also read it.

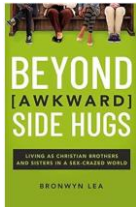

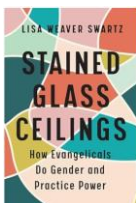
